

Church Council

Opened with prayer by our minister, Jonathan Drury, the Council approved the minutes of two previous meetings and then turned to Jonathan for his report. He spoke of how pleased he was with the spirit and work he has experienced in the church. In particular, he took not of the success of the University of Maine Singers concert and all that was involved to make it a fine success. He also took not of the fact that a second Neighborhood gathering and luncheon had taken place.

Moving on to committee reports, Sue Patterson was introduced to the Council, in her new role as the church's assistant treasurer, by the chair of the Board of Trustees. Together they informed the Council that the loan for the work on the manse has been signed and the money is now available. Much of the demolition work has been done and construction will move forward in April. In the hope that not all of the loan will have to be utilized, a capital campaign gift committee is being formed. Moving forward, it will be committed to raising \$100,000.

The next item of business taken up was a discussion of moving the morning service of worship during the summer to 9:00 in the morning. Although there had been discussion with our organist and choral music director, the consensus of opinion was that a decision should be put off until the next meeting.

Sue Patterson was then called upon for the Treasurer's report. The Faxon Fund has added more funds to its value during the month of February. However, no funds were distributed from it in January or February. The year-to-date operating expenses of the church has yielded a deficit of \$20,776. Consequently, Boards and committees have been urged to postpone, unless absolutely necessary, any expenses they may have. Expenses incurred in the restoration of the manse are kept in a separate account.

On April 28 our church will be the host for five other Upper Cape UCC youth groups for a Faith-in-Youth program.

Board of Trustees

As most of you are aware, a special meeting was held after church on March 10 to approve a \$400,000 line-of-credit that is secured by the Faxon Fund. This money was necessary to insure that we will have adequate funds to bring the manse up to a standard that will be comfortable for the Drury family and our church will be proud to own for many years to come. After questions regarding the condition of the manse were answered, the vote passed overwhelmingly. Home Services Company, owned by Walter Slaboden, has already done the demolition and is contracted to do the project after the building permit is secured by April 10. If you have not reviewed the pictures of the manse after demolition, be sure to do so — you won't believe it! A capital campaign to repay a good portion of the loan is now underway. Please stay tuned as you will hear from our newly-formed Capital Campaign Committee very shortly.

Board of Deacons

There are several members of our congregation who are no longer able to drive themselves to church worship services. We have discussed this issue at Deacons' meetings and considered a program to provide rides to church on Sunday mornings for those members. Martha has discussed such a program with our insurance broker to determine if the church could be liable in the event of an automobile accident. She has been informed that the church could be liable if IT matched a driver with a rider and asked the driver to "act as an agent of the church." However, if the church provides those needing a ride with a list of those willing to drive and the rider makes a personal arrangement with a driver, the church is not liable. Therefore, as a trial, we ask those members of the congregation who would be willing to drive other members to church to contact the church office. Martha will maintain a list of volunteers that she will share with those wishing a ride to church.

Stewardship Committee

While the world's 1.2 billion Catholics were celebrating the election of the latest Pope, America's Catholics continue to ignore the very precepts of that church. On issues of sexual relations, sexual orientation, women's rights, birth control, scientific inquiry and many others most American Catholics admit that their personal beliefs on these subjects are in direct opposition to their church. This is not meant as a judgment on American Catholics, but more to compare and contrast that structure with our own.

Unlike the Catholic Church and many Protestant denominations, we are not a hierarchical organization. Our church is run by its Lay Membership, they run the committees, control the budgets and decide who will minister to us. When Jonathan was chosen to be our new settled minister, I believe God's hand was involved in guiding him to our doorstep. But I am equally as happy that no bishop or senior official at the UCC simply appointed him to that post. Our association with the UCC, our Statement of Faith, our Sunday School curriculum; all these as-



pects of our church reflect what we as members of the church want. We teach that evolution is compatible with faith and we place no moral pre-conditions on Communion because those are the beliefs we hold.

The cost of having a church that is responsive to our view of Christianity is that it has to be financed by our membership. As the year goes on we will be asking a lot of our Congregation in that area. We will need funds to complete the Manse project, but those funds will have to come in addition to the annual pledge requests that support our operations and outreach activities.

We ask much, but provide so much more. We provide a community of faith in which your personal beliefs don't have to be left at the door and picked back up on your way home, but where they will be heard and, if enough people agree, adopted as part of our overall belief system.

Our church is truly our church in every way – with only God as our master.
