

"God Is Still Speaking" is the provocative and profound slogan at the center of the marketing campaign used by the United Church of Christ. The use of the ironic word "still," suggests we may have stopped recognizing God's active role in our lives while also suggesting there is indeed a church where the recognition of God's presence in the world is central to its purpose. I for one have little doubt regarding the evidence of God's participation in the lives of God's creations. I can "see" that the Holy Spirit occupies the seemingly empty space between two people, and God's love is all around us.



So, having duly recognized the purpose and effectiveness of the "God is Still Speaking" campaign, I must say if I were given the opportunity, I would change the slogan ever so slightly. Instead of "Still Speaking", I would focus the campaign's assurance upon the idea that "God Is Still Listening." When I consider the insecurity of our human condition, I believe we need to know now more than ever that God hears our prayers and we don't have to be afraid of being alone.

One reason my "God Is Still Listening" slogan would not be nearly as effective (from the perspective of the United Church of Christ) is that it contains no mandate regarding one's need to attend church. Prayer, like God, is portable. You can (and should) pray in your home, in your car, at work, at school, alone or in groups. All you need is the desire, hope, and faith that someone is listening.

I hope you know at the First Congregational Church there are people who are listening. We are here to listen to your shouts of triumph, and we are here to share your tears of frustration and pain. And if and when you ask to pray, we will be here to reach out across the Holy Spirit, take your hand, and together with you, share in the promise of God's love and grace.

Music Notes

As I was driving into town today, I was overwhelmed by the beauty of the greening trees. Each one has its own degree of greenish hue; some are lighter, some are darker; some are yellow and other tend more towards blue. I reflected on how much we are like those trees. Each of us has a different personality, a different set of beliefs or of lifestyle, and yet we are at the same time united as a congregation as well as a nation. In choirs we are united in a common cause: the cause to make music. Many voices coming together, each one with a different level of skill or voice range, yet, when pulling together, we make beautiful music. This summer we will continue to make music on Sundays.

Rehearsal will be held at 8:15 a.m. and our new shorter summer service will begin at 9:00 a.m. The music is easy and singable and we will sing only one anthem each week. There is also the possibility that the FCC Orchestra or members of that group will play for one or two services in lieu of the choir. If you've never sung in the choir or only have time to do so in the summer, we welcome you to our music-making organization with open hearts.

I recently read about an organ teacher who has noticed an upswing in the number of young musicians who have developed an interest in learning to play the pipe organ. We have several young people in our church who are developing into skilled pianist. I'd like to recommend that they consider also learning to play the organ. I've been asked many times by pastors and leaders of other churches if I know of anyone who could play the organ or piano. Competent organists are a sought-after commodity because there are so few currently available. The pipe organ is a magnificent instrument to play and is equally thrilling to hear, which is why it is called the king of instruments. Learning to play the organ can give a musician life-long opportunities in the music field as either a full or part-time musician. A lifetime of service to the church as a singer or player can be a very rewarding experience. If this sounds like a recruiting request, you are right. As our current aging generation of church musicians leave us, who will replace them in our choirs and at our organ consoles? This about it and if you are someone who thinks you might like to know more about the organ, we can point you in the right direction.

We're almost halfway there!



Once permits were received, the project has moved rapidly. The most noticeable signs of progress are the new rear exterior walls, new bulkhead, and the raised roof in the back to provide a consistent ceiling height for the kitchen. It was voted to install central air conditioning throughout the house for the benefit of both the house and the family. It appears that its cost can be absorbed within the existing budget, thus its approval. The exterior windows for the entire house have arrived, with the plan being to finish the exterior painting of the windows prior to their installation.

The Capital Campaign is now in full swing with pledges and gifts arriving regularly. The committee works weekly planning additional fundraisers to reduce the amount we will need to borrow for the project. Pledge cards have been sent to all members and friends on the church's mailing list and brochures have been prepared with the intent that the community-at-large will become interested and involved with the project.

The Children's Clothing Project is very successful this year and, because of increased interest from the Falmouth community, Outreach has decided to extend its services all through the summer. Thus, we are seeking volunteers to help on the 2nd and 4th Saturdays of June, July and August. Please consider signing up on the Opportunity Table. It is a fun and rewarding activity to do together!

Church Council

Having been called to order by moderator Tom Ryan and led in prayer by our minister, Jonathan Drury, the Council gave its attention first to his report. In it, Jonathan described the month now past as having been a very busy time. Indeed, from his point of view, it was a time which reflected the healthy vitality of the church's congregation. He took particular note of the reception of new members, the confirmation of three of our young people, a successful Rummage Sale, and the progress of the Capital Fund Drive. The committee organizing the drive has received a total of 41 pledges totaling \$61,000. A brochure describing the project has been prepared and will be circulated not only among our church members, but also in the community-at-large. In his report, Jonathan took special note of Adelaide Cummings, whose 99th birthday will be the occasion for a special party at the West Falmouth Library.

Looking ahead in regard to the manse renovation, the group responsible for its oversight has made the decision to have central air conditioning installed. While obviously serving to keep it more comfortable in the summer, the air conditioning will serve the well-being of the house itself throughout the year. Although a definite date was not established, dedication of the manse will likely occur in September.

One date which was agree upon was a "Clean up Day" on June 8, when the grounds of the church property will be picked up and made more presentable. Volunteers are needed. Another date to remember is August 15 when our church will be host site for the Falmouth Service Center's program, "Falmouth Eats Together."

Our treasurer reported that the pledged program support was 4% better for the month of April than our budget anticipated. Income from the Faxon fund was on target. As of this date, no borrowing has been required to meet the cost of the manse renovation. Other reports were presented to the Council by the Deacons, the church delegates, the Reception Committee, Nominating, Women's Union, Sunday School, and Outreach Committees.

The Deacons reported that during July and August, the morning service will be at 9:00 a.m. Taking note of the confirmation of three persons, they spoke in particular of the excellent work Dennis McGillicuddy has done in teaching that group each year. Concern as to getting ushers for morning service was expressed and the need for members to keep the church office informed as to members who would welcome visitors. This year, the Women's Union awarded scholarships to Elisabeth Bowerman and Henry Abrams. The Sunday School held their annual pancake breakfast on May 19 and are also the happy recipients of two sofas from Kathie & Day Mount. The Children's Clothing Project will operate through the summer this year.
